### Where Are They Now?

We reached out to Birthingway Lactation Consultation Program graduate, **Adrienne Koznek**, who matriculated in 2014 and graduated in 2015.

### When and how did you become part of the Birthingway community?

I was part of the 2014 Lactation
Consultation Program cohort at
Birthingway. I chose Birthingway
because I had a strong desire to
become an International Board
Certified Lactation Consultant
(IBCLC) and they offered a Pathway 2
Program. This program was a good fit
for me, as I already had a bachelor's
degree that covered some required
courses.

### How has being a part of the Birthingway community impacted your life?

I'm grateful for the opportunity to learn about NVC and the ability to incorporate practicing empathy with people in my every day life, as well as with my patients. I always appreciated the holistic approach to medicine and care that Birthingway teaches as well.



### How has Birthingway prepared you to be successful working in the community?

I am forever grateful to the amazing instructors I had. Adrienne Fuson taught me everything I know about how to blend empathy and care with knowledge of complex cases. I liken her manner of teaching to "I'm going to throw you into the deep end of the swimming pool and encourage you to teach yourself" - and while it was so difficult in the moment, I'm glad she did that. It has instilled confidence in me and my abilities that I may not have otherwise had.

### Where would we find you now and what amazing things are you doing?

I'm working as an IBCLC at Vitality NW, a natural medicine clinic in the

Tigard area. I'm working with Dr. Alicia Hart, a naturopathic physician who provides primary care to all members of the family, and specializes in postpartum and pediatrics. Also at the clinic is Dr. Stacie Wolfe, an ND who has a passion for helping people heal from trauma. We are a Health at Every Size clinic and are queer-friendly.

As an out of hospital IBCLC, I'm not confined to the rules of the hospital that sometimes end up failing families on their breastfeeding journeys. I'm skilled in assessing for oral restrictions that are impeding breastfeeding. In addition to having appointments on weekdays at the clinic, I'm also available for home visits. I proudly accept OHP for clinic visits. Additionally, I currently accept United Health Care. I'm happy to answer questions about cash fees as well.

We are located at 7455 SW Bridgeport Road Ste. 240 in Tigard's Bridgeport Village shopping center.

### **INTRAPARTUM**

During first year, second term, our Midwifery Program students take a course called Intrapartum. This is required core course that covers the psychophysiology of labor and birth, as well as the biodynamic facilitation of first, second, third, and fourth stages of labor. Also covered during this course is unusual situations, such as precipitous birth, cord prolapse, nuchal cord, back labor, abruption, previa, and hemorrhage.

On October 19<sup>th</sup>, students practiced hands-on learning about nuchal, prolapsed, and short cords, uterus size, and how to measure dilation using their fingers. Students reported that it helps make the theory more real!







### Sustainability at Birthingway!

This past October, Birthingway celebrated its first annual "October Sustainability Month." The Birthingway entryway sported a super cool cardboard poster, showing off how Birthingway's programs contribute to greater sustainability in our communities, as well as information on our participation in the Northwest Earth Institute's EcoChallenge and on current events.


The community was asked how they felt our programs contribute to a more sustainable world. Responses were extensive, including how homebirth requires fewer resources and can be more cost effective than a hospital birth. Lactation care supports breastfeeding, which means less use of formula, and therefore less waste through the resources used to create and put it on shelves.



Our Doula Program is also another great example, as we are able to provide resources, support and education to underserved and low income populations, adding to quality of life and in turn social sustainability. Midwives, lactation consultants and doulas contribute to both healthy environments and flourishing communities!

### NATURE

Birthingway also took place in the Northwest Earth Institute's EcoChallenge. With 19 participants, the Birthingway team racked up 5,149 points! Activities included simple ways to become more ecologically conscious. Natalie Hutchinson, our Faculty Coordinator, said this about her experience: "The best part about participating in the eco-challenge was that I got to celebrate all the things I'm already doing every day and pick a few new things that I could add to my routine to push me to do a little more for our environment." Staff Transition Specialist, **Brittany Schleiff**, also found her experience to be really insightful, such as in recognizing that even with a lack of composting at home, she was able to save food scraps and bring them into town where composting is available. **Drake Carnahan** (Operations Coordinator) dedicated her EcoChallenge weeks to taking her dog on daily walks, racking up over 23 miles of walking around her neighborhood. Way to go, everyone! Big thank yous to all those who took part in this challenge.

The baby seems like a gift from God, and the couple's reasoning for keeping her seduces the reader into entering the waters of treacherous morality even as Tom--whose moral code withstood the horrors of World War I--begins to waver.

M. L. Stedman's vivid characters and gorgeous descriptions of the solitude of Janus Rock and of the unpredictable Australian frontier create a perfect backdrop for the tale of longing, loss, and the overwhelming love for a child that is The Light Between Oceans.

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
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
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
